Message from the President

Dear Alumni & Friends,

I would like to begin by expressing my gratitude to Class 1986, led by Marie Karen Jiz, Jere Cejar, Rovea Onglatco, and Marigold Milliam, for stepping up as partners for our Fundraising Committee. The foundation deeply appreciates their efforts and is truly grateful for their dedication in taking on this important challenge.

The Friends of UP Visayas High School Foundation, Inc. began with a vision to preserve the legacy of the UP High School in Iloilo (UPHSI) while empowering its students, faculty, and community.

This vision was first realized through the *Handumanan Project*, which restored the heritage-rich Old High School Building and Women's Club, thanks to the ₱25-million funding from the General Appropriations Act (GAA) of 2022 and the steadfast support of former Senate President Franklin Drilon (Class 1961).

Moreover, we are proud to share the completion of the ₱10-million renovation of the UP High School Building through the efforts of the Secretary of Education Sonny Angara which modernized its facilities.

In addition to this, we are also pleased to announce the forthcoming inauguration of the Multi-Purpose Building, a ₱20.243-million initiative led by Rep. James "Jojo" Ang of the USWAG Ilonggo Party-list, with the support of Senator Loren Legarda, Governor Arthur Defensor, Jr., and former Senator Franklin Drilon. This event is scheduled to take place on **March 23, 2026, at 10:00 AM**. We extend our invitation for your presence at this important occasion.



Looking ahead, we are happy to report that Rep. Julianne "Jam-Jam" Baronda, of the lone legislative district of Iloilo City, has appropriated **₱30 million** for UP Visayas Iloilo City Campus in the GAA of 2026. This funding will further strengthen the university's infrastructure and programs.

As we planned for the **Principal's Wishlist for 2026**, support immediately poured in, and we are glad to share that all rooms slated for rehabilitation have already been committed by various alumni classes. This initiative, which we aim to complete by May or June 2026, focuses on renovating and refurbishing essential rooms, including the installation of new windows, upgrades to the conference room, research laboratory, computer laboratory, view room, and utility room, as well as the installation of emergency lights and fire extinguishers. We are deeply grateful for the overwhelming generosity and commitment of our alumni community.

Message from the President

To date, we have already received **₱3,087,208.01** in support, and we remain optimistic as we wait for other commitments to come in.

The previous Annual Fundraiser raised ₱8.27 million, enabling us to address critical needs like major electrification, facility upgrades, scholarships, and healthcare insurance for faculty members and staff. These achievements were made possible by your generosity.

However, we can still do more for UP High School. As we move forward, we remain committed to finding ways to support the immediate and important needs of the high school. In line with this, we have reached out to Rep. James “Jojo” Ang, who has graciously committed to supporting a fencing project for the city campus. We hope this initiative inspires our alumni to stay engaged and supportive as we work together for the betterment of our school.

Additionally, around ₱500,000 is needed to provide financial assistance to support our faculty, staff, and students in their academic and non-academic activities, including participation in conferences and competitions. Your support provides opportunities to attend competitions that they may not have been able to participate in during previous years.

As we continue to work together toward these goals, we are excited to celebrate the progress we’ve made so far. We are looking forward to welcoming you, our alumni and donors to the inauguration of the renovated facilities you have so generously sponsored by April. During the **UPHSI Family Day on April 11, 2026**, the foundation will also be awarding the championship trophy and cash incentives for the winners of the Palarong Yupihay. We hope to see you there!

Message from the Principal



Warm greetings from UP High School in Iloilo!

On behalf of the entire UPHSI community, I would like to express my gratitude to our alumni and friends for your unwavering support during our previous annual fundraiser. Your generosity has made a lasting impact on our school.

Last year, ₱800,000 was dedicated to improving our school facilities, ensuring a better learning environment for our students. Scholarships and food allowances amounting to ₱130,000 have eased the burden of deserving students, while ₱423,365 allocated for HMO coverage has greatly benefited our hardworking faculty and staff. Your contributions have also allowed us to attend both local and international conferences, organize important events, and address immediate school concerns.

This year, we are honored to share that the rehabilitation of our key learning spaces has been supported by the generous contributions of various alumni classes. Their support has helped us address priority areas, including:

- Installation of awning windows for improved ventilation and safety
- Upgrading of the Conference Room, Research, Computer, and View Laboratories
- Repairs in the Utility Room
- Installation of emergency lights and fire extinguishers

These improvements are estimated to cost ₱2,172,870.26. While we have made significant progress, there is still much to be done, and we humbly appeal for your continued support to fully realize these projects.

In addition to the rehabilitation project, UPHSI also seeks financial assistance to support our faculty, staff, and students in yearlong academic and non-academic activities. Participation in various conferences and competitions has greatly boosted the morale and confidence of our students, providing them with invaluable experiences and opportunities for growth. This initiative is estimated to cost around ₱500,000. Your support in this area will ensure that our students and educators continue to excel and represent UPHSI with pride.

As I approach the end of my first term as Principal, I reflect on these achievements with immense gratitude. Looking ahead, I hope to serve a second term to build on this momentum. I plan to strengthen our collaborations with the PTA and Alumni to address the school's ongoing needs. Together, we will seek funding to develop and improve crucial learning spaces. Our upcoming priorities include:

- Creating a botanical garden around the UPHSI Building, featuring learning hubs, a science garden, and a potential student center
- Enhancing the Division of Professional Education and UPHSI Administration Office
- Upgrading the Research Room, Archive Room, and Record Section
- Constructing a new fence surrounding the UPHSI Building for enhanced campus security
- Completing two unfinished rooms in the SHS Building
- Refurbishing the new UPHSI Library and Guidance Office

The Annual Fundraiser is a collaboration among the high school alumni, alumni organizations, and friends coming together to raise funds for the foundation's projects.

The primary objective is to extend unrestricted financial assistance and support to the students and faculty of UPHSI, ensuring they have access to necessary resources and opportunities.

Launched on May 28, 2024, the fundraiser started with an initial ₱3,000,000.00 seed fund from the Francis and Chit Jardeleza Foundation, RSA Foundation, and the ICTSI Foundation Inc.

With the involvement of various alumni batches and friends of UPHSI, the fundraiser has raised over **₱11,357,208.01** in total as of March 2026.

Annually, major projects are identified depending on the urgent needs of the high school. The first annual fundraiser was able to help set up the additional source of electricity, not only for the high school but the whole city campus. This year, renovations on various rooms were prioritized.



KEY UPGRADES INCLUDE THE INSTALLATION OF MODERN AWNING WINDOWS, EMERGENCY LIGHTS, AND FIRE EXTINGUISHERS, ENSURING BOTH FUNCTIONALITY AND SAFETY. 







GRACIANO LÓPEZ JAENA HONORED WITH BOOK LAUNCH AND 169TH BIRTH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION



ILOILO CITY—The National Museum of the Philippines - Iloilo became a center of celebration on December 18, 2025, as the 169th birth anniversary of Graciano López Jaena was marked with the launch of Graciano's Dirty Fingers, a new book by Emmanuel Leroná (UP High School Class 1999). The event, sponsored by the Friends of UP Visayas High School Foundation, Inc., brought together scholars, advocates, and the public to honor the life and legacy of the national hero from Jaro, Iloilo City.

López Jaena, the founding editor of *La Solidaridad*, the newspaper of the Reformists that later inspired the 1898 Philippine Revolution, was celebrated not only for his contributions to Philippine history but also for his enduring influence on the nation's identity. Leroná's book offers a fresh perspective on López Jaena's life, blending archival research and storytelling to challenge traditional approaches to history.

The program featured the unveiling of Do Doy Setubal's portrait of López Jaena and a performance by the Hubon Taliambong Community Theater, which presented excerpted songs from their play *Ciano*, a tribute to the hero's life and work.

A panel discussion on "Counter-Archive as Historiography" added depth to the event, with insights from Dr. Genevieve Asenjo, Dr. Ma. Luisa Mabunay, Prof. Stephen B. Alayon, Mia Fe Lopez-Cruz, and Berks Joseph Barrios Tan. The discussion explored how archives shape historical narratives and collective memory.

As part of the celebration, Dr. Reynaldo "Bong" Gustilo, Vice President of the Friends of UP Visayas High School Foundation, Inc., turned over books to representatives of local government units and libraries across Iloilo, ensuring that López Jaena's legacy reaches communities far and wide.

The event was made possible through the collaboration of several organizations, including the Dr. Graciano Lopez Jaena Foundation, Inc., the University of the Philippines Visayas Center for West Visayan Studies, the UPV Office of Alumni Relations, Kasingkasing Press, West Visayas State University Maaram, WVSU DevCom Society, WVSU Athenaeum Keepers, WYWV West TV, and the University of San Agustin Archives and Museum.

Copies of Graciano's Dirty Fingers were sold at a special launch price of Php 400, with many attendees eager to delve deeper into López Jaena's legacy.

The book launch was a fitting tribute to one of Iloilo's most celebrated figures, combining art, scholarship, and community to honor his legacy.

PAG-ULIKID: NO STUDENT LEFT BEHIND PROJECT

The No Student Left Behind is an assistance program that supports deserving and in-need students of UP High School in Iloilo by providing a Php 20,000 annual allowance. This initiative aims to alleviate the financial challenges students face, enabling them to focus on their academic and personal growth.

Additionally, this project grants a monthly food allowance to a number of students. This initiative is inspired by the efforts of Class 1983 under the leadership of Atty. Nellie Jo Aujero-Regalado. Through this program, students who are in need are provided with their most basic needs.

In 2025, the foundation provided Php130,000 which covered one semester of food and cash allowance to ten students of the UP High School. This semester in 2026, another set of students were granted this scholarship, amounting to Php 110,000.

OVERVIEW OF THE PROJECT

Allocating at least 855,000 pesos for the school year 2024-2025, this fund addresses the evolving needs of UPHSI. With the guidance of the high school principal, assigned committee members, and the members of the alumni community, appropriation of funds are allocated to various activities, conferences, and other emerging needs of the high school throughout the school year.

A portion of the funds was utilized through a diverse range of activities, including the UPHSI Open House, Student Council projects, and research conferences in Baguio, Malaysia, Singapore, and Japan.

Moreover, this added assistance for the Faculty Development Fund for a research paper presentations.

Around ₱500,000 is expected to be raised to cover for the upcoming expenses for these activities this year.

UPHSI FACULTY AND STAFF WELLNESS PROJECT



This project provides health insurance coverage to tenured faculty members and staff of UPHSI, ensuring they have reliable healthcare assistance when needed. In 2024, the foundation allocated ₱18,407.20 per employee, totaling to around ₱423,365.60. The health insurance was once again renewed for 2025-2026, amounting to ₱457,386.05.

Through Aon's Benefits Care Program, each member is entitled to ₱200,000.00 coverage in major hospitals nationwide under PhilCare. This also includes free dental services.

The foundation is looking forward to sustain this program in order to ensure that faculty members and other personnel of the high school department are covered annually.

PROJECT WELLNESS: MESSAGE FROM A FACULTY MEMBER

PROF. DOMINIQUE MAQUIRAN, ALONG WITH OTHER FACULTY MEMBERS AND STAFF OF UPHSI, IS A BENEFICIARY OF THE FOUNDATION'S HMO PROJECT

“Just recently, I started feeling some discomfort in my abdomen. At first, it was mild, but after a while, it became painful. I thought it was just my usual acid reflux from drinking coffee, so I didn’t pay much attention to it. But when the pain continued for days, I decided it was time to have it checked at the hospital.

As a regular employee, budgeting for everyday needs is already challenging, and unexpected medical concerns can really add to the stress.

Good thing we have our HMO. I honestly felt relieved knowing I could use it for my outpatient consultation. The HMO was a big help.

From check-ups to lab tests, including a whole abdomen ultrasound, my expenses were covered, so I didn’t have to worry about the cost. My doctor is still working it up to better understand my condition, so I need to undergo a few more tests.

REKINDLING TIES AFTER 25 YEARS

We entered UPHSI in 1996 as what would later be known as the Millennium Class. Early in our high school years, we found ourselves actively participating in several protest movements, including opposition to the local government's proposal—eventually withdrawn—to revert the UPV City Campus to its former function as Iloilo City Hall, as well as demonstrations related to the corruption scandal involving then President Joseph Estrada. These experiences unfolded alongside broader societal developments that shaped our formative years: the transition to the year 2000 amid concerns over the Y2K Bug, the early integration of the internet into education in Iloilo City, and rapid advances in communication technologies, from pagers to mobile phones.

Our batch was considered pioneering in two key institutional initiatives. First, we marked the launch of UPHSI's stronger commitment to science education through the establishment of its first Special Science Class (SSC). This program was championed by Prof. Evelyn Baylocon, who later became principal and also served as our math instructor. Second, under the administration of Prof. Zenaida Buenaflor, UPHSI prioritized the admission of dependents of UPV personnel, shaping the composition of the student body during our time. As a result, our academic development was closely monitored, particularly through efforts to enhance SSC students' competencies via additional coursework, while avoiding significant academic disparities between the SSC and the regular classes.

REKINDLING TIES AFTER 25 YEARS

Despite these intentions, the structure of the SSC created practical divisions within our batch. SSC students were dismissed an hour later than their peers, which limited regular interaction outside class hours. Moreover, while students from the regular classes could transfer between sections, the SSC experienced attrition without inward migration. Over time, this led to differing social dynamics: students from the regular classes developed broader peer networks, while the SSC remained comparatively insular.

From the outset, we recognized that this longstanding divide between the regular classes and the SSC would pose the greatest challenge in bringing together the entire Class of 2000 for the preparations for Goldies Day 2025. Many of us were already managing family responsibilities or holding professional and managerial roles, which limited participation. Initial invitations to class meetings, even virtual ones, were poorly attended. Nevertheless, a small core group persisted in organizing the event, with responsibilities shared flexibly and equitably, including contributions from classmates based overseas.

As planning continued, participation gradually increased. As hoped, attendance during the actual event exceeded initial expectations. Goldies Day 2025 proved to be a success not only as a homecoming of alumni across generations, but more significantly as the first time in 25 years that Class 2000 came together as one. The activities encouraged interaction and created longoverdue opportunities for social engagement. For the first time since we left the doors of UPHSI, we gathered again to play music, trade high school jokes and banter, and share 25 years' worth of life stories—stories that unfolded along different paths and in different places, yet ultimately led us back to the same shared laughter, memories, and sense of belonging. UPV HIGH SCHOOL CLASS OF 1986 40TH HOMECOMING REUNION



Forty years ago, we walked the halls of UPV High School as young students, shaped by the spirit and events of the early 1980s. The world then was changing fast—politically, socially, and culturally—but nowhere was that change more deeply felt than in the Philippines.

In 1986, our country stood at a historic turning point. We lived through the closing years of dictatorship rule, heard stories of censorship and courage, and saw families quietly yearning for change. Then came the EDSA People Power Revolution—millions of Filipinos, armed not with weapons but with faith, music, prayers, and yellow ribbons, standing together for truth and democracy. Even as high school students, we sensed that the peaceful transition of power was bigger than any one of us. It showed us that unity, conscience, and moral courage could reshape a nation.

Inside UPV High School, those years from 1982 to 1986 were just as alive. The classrooms, corridors, canteens, and open spaces where we studied, laughed, and sometimes worried about exams became the backdrop of friendships that would span decades. We learned not only equations and grammar, but also discipline, respect, public service, and the value of speaking up kindly but firmly. UPVHS was our training ground—where homeroom sessions, school programs, clubs, and outreach activities quietly molded us into more aware and responsible citizens.

**Reflections, Forty Years After 1986**

Now, as we gather for our 40th Homecoming Reunion, we look back with gratitude and humility. We do not need to single out “notable” individuals, because each one of us is remarkable in our own way. We have taken many different paths—some of us stayed close to home, others crossed oceans, some built careers in classrooms, offices, farms, hospitals, laboratories, and communities. We have raised families, served our country in quiet and visible ways, created opportunities for others, and faced life’s turning points with courage. We have known both success and disappointment, gain and loss. Yet throughout the seasons of our lives, the lessons and friendships from UPVHS have remained constant, shaping who we are and how we continue to make a difference, wherever we may be.

- We remember teachers who believed in us before we believed in ourselves.
- We remember classmates who stood by us in our most awkward and uncertain years.
- We remember how, in a time of national change, our school taught us to think critically, to care deeply, and to act with integrity.

Forty years on, we realize that our greatest achievements are not just the titles we carry, but the lives we touch, the families we raise, the communities we serve, and the honesty with which we try to live each day. Our story—as the UPVHS Class of 1986—is a story of resilience, faith, and shared hope.

A Message to the Younger Generation

To the students and young alumni who now walk the same halls we once did, know that you are growing up in a world that is faster, more connected, and more complex than the one we knew in 1986. Technology, information, and opportunities are at your fingertips—but so are distractions, pressures, and noise.
